

13 October 2022

Sarah Cove: The Father of Modern Painting? A Closer Look at Constable's Great Landscapes

Sarah is a leading authority on Constable. Her expert eye managed to identify two 'lost' works by Constable on BBC's Fake or Fortune. In this lecture she will be exploring the artistic legacy that Constable bequeathed to today's modern artists through a closer examination of his great landscape paintings. 4 November 2022

Study Day: Chatsworth: with Simon Seligman

St Marys Kippington, starts 10.30 am Lunch included (AS Members £38)

Simon will give three talks on this historic building, its contents, gardens and occupants: Passions, Personalities and Patronage; The Duke of Devonshire's Elysian Fields: the Evolution of the Designed Landscape and 'Debo' Mitford, Cavendish, Devonshire Duchess, Housewife

10 November 2022

Alice White: Ways To Look at Painting

Alice provides a contemporary painter's perspective on famous artworks from the 17th to the 21st centuries. She identifies Rembrandt and Turner as artistic risk-takers who redefined the language of painting and led the way for experimental modern artists such as Jackson Pollock and Fontana. Her inspiring lecture uncovers a new way of seeing painting.

8 December 2022

Sarah Lenton: Christmas at Covent Garden: 300 Years of Christmas Shows at one of London's Great Theatres

The London Christmas season was invented at Covent Garden, and today's operas and ballets can be traced back to Harlequin and Columbine and those early shows. Panto has moved elsewhere,

but Sarah's lecture shows how pantomime still lives on in the seasonal operas and ballets staged at the Royal Opera House today.

12 January 2023

Judy Rudoe: The Power of Jewellery: Adornment and Ritual from Prehistory to the Present

What is the meaning of jewellery? In this thoughtprovoking lecture Judy expands the concept of jewellery, how it is used and why people wear it. Jewellery can be a vital tool of communication, from ancient burial ornaments and objects of ritual to desirable works of art that harness the skills of goldsmiths, gem-setters and enamellers.

9 February 2023

James Allan: Domes and Minarets: Mosques of the Islamic World

This lecture looks at three great mosques, the Friday Mosque in Cordoba, the Mosque of Suleyman the Great in Istanbul and the Royal Mosque in Isfahan and explores their different styles of architecture and their skylines. We will also see some of the rich designs of Islamic art that adorn these magnificent buildings.

3 March 2023

Study Day: Art Nouveau and Art Deco with Ian Gledhill

Kippington Hall, starts 10.30; Lunch included In three lectures, Ian will trace the origins of Art Nouveau in the Arts and Crafts Movement, its blooming in France and Belgium in the 1900s and how it evolved into Art Deco, the brilliant and colourful style of the "Jazz Age" which swept the world

9 March 2023

Sophie Oosterwijk: Sinner or Saint? The Changing Face of Mary Magdalene

Who was Mary Magdalene? The saint as we know her in the West is actually a conflation of four different female characters from the Gospels. This lecture will explain the fascinating stories and startling depictions of this popular saint in western art.

13 April 2023

Colin Pink: The Art of Weimar Germany

Between 1919 and Hitler's rise to power in 1933, the Weimar Republic saw an amazing flourishing of the arts, including art schools such as the Bauhaus. Colin shows how artists, photographers and satirists reflected the political turmoil in their work and developed a new sardonic realism that was not to last.

11 May 2023

Georgina Bexon: The Art and Architecture of Sri Lanka

Shrines, stupas, cave temples, colonial grandeur and modernist architecture – Georgina will look at the history of this beautiful island through its intriguing art and culture. For much of Sri Lanka's past Buddhist and Hindu have lived alongside each other peaceably and much of its culture is evidence of this spirit of tolerance and generosity.

8 June 2023

Anthony Russell: Blenheim Palace: The Agony and the Ecstasy

The story of Blenheim Palace's construction is a fascinating catalogue of excess and outrage. Anthony will explore these themes and the characters involved, marvelling at the genius of Vanburgh and considering the real impact the palace has left on the nation

13 July 2023 Sophie Matthews Music In Art

So many of our historical references for musical instruments can be found in works of art. Music and different instruments play a strong role within symbolism in art. Sophie explores the instruments in selected works and then gives demonstrations on replicas of the instruments depicted.
